The Empathy Challenge BY REV. HARRY GYOKYO BRIDGE

EMPATHY IS A CONCEPT THAT I have known about for a long time, but it is only recently that I am really coming to appreciate it. I probably was first exposed to the idea through Star Trek: The Next Generation. One of the characters, Deanna Troi, the ship's counselor aboard the starship Enterprise, was half-Betazoid. Her mother was fully

telepathic, but since she was "only" half, Troi could only sense others' emotions. So "empathy" probably wasn't the right word; instead, she was referred to as an "empath" and her abilities were "empathic."

Another aspect of empathy that I remember hearing was that it is a level above sympathy. Sympathy might be being aware of others' feelings, with empathy consisting of the actual feeling of the emotions of others. I don't think that these are hard and fast definitions, they are probably much closer than this, and yet they still point to an aspect of empathy - the experience of the emotions of another person.

IN EARLIER ARTICLES IN THIS series, I reviewed two of the three categories of assets that comprise the financial structure of the Buddhist Church of Oakland: Operating Funds and Organizational Accounts. In the most recent a srticle, I provided an overview of our Special Funds, which have been established by the BCO Board or by donors for specific purposes. You will recall that (a) the use of those funds is restricted to their specified purposes, (b) oversight of the funds may be specified by the donors or provided by the Board, in consultation with the donor or the donor's family when possible, (c) some funds may be set up as endowments, while others may be expended for the specified purposes until the funds are exhausted, and (d) BCO welcomes and encourages donations to any of our Special Funds or to establish new funds. In this and the following series of articles, we'll begin to look at the individual funds that comprise the Special Funds group.

The funds that are perhaps most familiar to BCO members are the three funds that we collectively call the "Education Funds," because these funds provide the resources for the scholarships that are awarded each year to graduating high school seniors at the annual Graduation Service. (I'd like to thank Robert Noguchi, current convener of the ad hoc scholarship committee, for supplemental information on each of these funds.) The three funds are:

 The Reverend Toshio Murakami Fund. Rev. Murakami served as BCO resident minister from 1984-86. His gift was designated to "encourage and support young Buddhists for their pursuit of becoming good leaders in the Sangha, community and the world in the light of Namu Amida Butsu." One or more Murakami Youth Sangha scholarship awards for collegebound high school seniors are conferred each year. In 2018, the awardee was Leila Neishi.

- The Nakashima/Masuyama Fund. This fund was established by gifts from Mr. and Mrs. Toshio Nakashima, in memory of Mr. Kikutaro Nakashima, and Rev. and Mrs. Kenyu Masuyama (BCO resident minister, 1954-68 and 1986-87), and is designated to provide support for activities that advance the Jodo Shinshu teachings, including the Church's Life Enrichment Program. One or more Nakashima/Masuyama Life Enrichment scholarship awards may be conferred on graduating high school seniors each year. Sydney Wong was awarded this scholarship in 2018. The fund also supports activities as varied as seminars, guest speakers and other special events, and partial support for BCO members' registrations at regional and national meetings and educational events.
- The Reverend Zuikei Taniguchi Fund. This fund was established by Rev. Taniguchi (resident minister, 1971-83) and his family in appreciation for the kindness and support they received during their 12 years at BCO, and is designated to provide scholarship awards. One or more Taniguchi Dharma Awards, acknowledging outstanding Dharma School students upon high school gradua-

tion, may be conferred annually. The 2018 awardee was Alyssa Cho.

Scholarship awards are determined each year by an ad hoc committee typically chaired by the Vice President - Religious, and including the resident minister, the church president(s), a representative of the Masuyama family, and one of the parent advisors from the Junior YBA. Other uses of these funds (most notably the Nakashima/Masuyama Fund) are determined by the Board, in consultation with donor family representatives as appropriate.

Each of these funds may be used for the intended purposes until depleted, and each may receive additional donations from time to time. Of the three funds, the Murakami Fund is closest to being exhausted, holding assets of less than \$700 at this writing. When this fund, which is the primary source of funds for student scholarships, is fully depleted, the church will need to reconsider its strategies for funding and awarding scholarships. At the current award level, the Murakami Fund will be exhausted in one or two years unless refreshed with additional donations.

Can we be empathetic? Should we be empathetic? Although we cannot truly feel the emotions of another like Deanna Troi in Star Trek, I think that empathy is worth cultivating. Even to just consider what another person is going through is taking a step towards empathy. Usually we just make assumptions, or even just walk on by without even acknowledging the feelings of other people. But if we can take a moment to try and think about what someone else is going through, then we have already taken a step beyond our own perspective.

One of my challenges to Church members and myself this past summer has been to "try and look at things from another perspective." I'm not sure how successful I have been - have you tried? Taking on this challenge in the context of empathy may be a way to make it more real. Shinran Shonin cautions us from thinking that we are undertaking Great Compassion, but I think that this first step towards empathy makes us more aware of what compassion is about - in case you didn't notice, I think that empathy and compassion are deeply linked. Trying to see things through someone else's eyes, even if it doesn't awaken true empathy in me, it at the very least shows me that my own perspective is limited. Realizing this, how much more do I Take Refuge in the Buddha of Infinite

Light and Immeasurable Life - Namo Amida Butsu - trying to help others and grow beyond myself at the same time that I realize how difficult this truly is. But I am not alone - the Wisdom & Compassion of Amida Buddha always shines on me, transforming me no matter how hard I resist!

So let's all undertake this Empathy Challenge - try and see things from the perspective of another. Try and realize that our own perspective is limited. Try and see that the big picture is much bigger than we realize. And whether or not you are successful, Take Refuge in Amida Buddha - Namo Amida Butsu!!!
